

Spinal Cord Injury Medicine Fellowship Program

Overview

The Spinal Cord Injury Medicine (SCIM) Fellowship is an ACGME accredited 1 year clinical program, with both inpatient (4 months, 2 consultative, 2 direct care) and outpatient (4 months) experiences. The remaining 4 months consist of a combination of rotations through selected experiences in orthopedic surgery, neurology, neuro ICU, emergency medicine, physical medicine and rehabilitation and research (other rotations are available according to interest).

The curriculum is designed to train physicians in the acute and chronic medical and rehabilitative care of individuals with paralysis related to traumatic and non-traumatic spinal cord dysfunction. Following are the goals and objectives for the fellowship:

Goals: To ensure superior training so that graduating physicians are able to address the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and management of SCD in both acute and chronic lifelong phases.

Objectives: To provide the fellow opportunities to develop a unique set of attitudes, knowledge and psychomotor skills that would allow for effective, up to date, compassionate treatment of SCD.

We are affiliated with the Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine and the Johns Hopkins Hospital via our parent program, the Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation Department at Johns Hopkins. For the past nineteen years, Johns Hopkins Hospital has been ranked number one-the leader of all American medical centers.

The Spinal Cord Injury Medicine (SCIM) Fellowship at Kennedy Krieger Institute (KKI) and Johns Hopkins University (JHU) was established in July 2007 under the auspices of the Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Department and is an ACGME accredited program.

It has been created to offer training in both adult and pediatric acute and chronic, traumatic and non-traumatic conditions affecting the spinal cord. There is a special emphasis on medical and rehabilitative interventions used to optimize and enhance neural restoration throughout a patient's lifetime.

The program is a natural extension of the KKI and JHU mission to provide advanced training to physicians who provide care to individuals with disabilities.

The program offers training in areas of focus including inpatient and outpatient pediatric SCI rehabilitation and care, inpatient and outpatient adult SCI rehabilitation and care, neurology, spine neurosurgery, spine or specialized (tendon, nerve transfer) orthopedic surgery, plastic surgery and offers electives in emergency medicine, neuro-intensive care, neuro-radiology, pain management and research.
